Curators' Statement International Ecoperformance Film Festival: Rhode Island Edition

The Rhode Island edition of the International Ecoperformance Film Festival is a three-day event which introduces the concept of ecoperformance to the Rhode Island community in the hope to spark meaningful conversations and actions in the local community and beyond.

The International Ecoperformance Film Festival originated in Brazil in 2021 as an artistic response to the eco-political challenges of the 21st century. In bringing this festival and its founders, Maura Baiocchi and Wolfgang Pannek, to the Rhode Island area, we invite you to come together as a community to gain awareness of the eco-political challenges, both well-known and lesser known, that we are facing, and to learn how art can help us form a response to these challenges.

Over the three days of the festival, we will pay attention to all the dimensions of ecoperformance. We will witness how the concept and practice of ecoperformance engage with human issues, while trying to never lose sight of the more-than-human world we are entangled in. Shifting scales and geographical locations, we will first zoom out to consider how ecoperformance functions in a global context, by watching films created in 34 countries. We will then zoom in to witness how local artists have taken up ecoperformance to address concerns specific to the Rhode Island area.

As curators of this local edition, we are excited to explore the resonances between the concept of ecoperformance and work that is already happening both at Brown University (for example, with the recent creation of the Center for Environmental Humanities) and in the local community.

Our goal for this gathering is twofold. First, to strengthen community awareness of the manifold eco-political challenges that we are facing, both near and afar. Second, to show how art, as a truly multidisciplinary and cross-cultural practice, offers creative ways to face or to engage with these challenges – ways to "stay with the trouble," to borrow Donna Haraway's expression.

On a personal level, all three of us have found the concept of ecoperformance useful to our respective artistic and scholarly practices. Together, we draw from our different backgrounds and artistic fields and expertise to explore how we can learn more, and care more about the land and its past, present and future inhabitants, whether human or nonhuman.

We feel confident that the festival will provide the local community with plenty of opportunities to engage with ecoperformance, and are looking forward to the vibrant talks and discussions that the festival will initiate. Our hope is that the festival will result in a prolonged exchange of ideas and experiences, across Brown University, Rhode Island, and beyond. Thank you for taking part in this journey with us.

Statement by the Founders of the International Ecoperformance Film Festival

As organizers of a project that addresses the threat to living conditions on planet Earth from an artistic perspective, the Rhode Island Edition of the International Ecoperformance Film Festival gives strong cause for celebration.

Solving global problems requires cooperation between people with intertwined sensibilities, ideas, and practices at a regional and intercontinental level.

Our gratitude goes to the curators Julie Dind, Inga Chinilina, and Rolf Gerstlauer for proposing to "introduce the concept of ecoperformance to the local community" of Providence; to Brown Arts Institute's IGNITE program for hosting this initiative originating in the Brazilian Midwest; to the juries of the International and the IGNITE selections and to Melissa Kievman's attentive production team.

Significant steps have been taken since 'ecoperformance' was coined in 2009 as part of Taanteatro's research to motivate a non-anthropocentric turn in the performing arts:

From staging performances and films to hosting debate forums, from organizing an online project to an in-person festival in several locations accompanied by publications.

The IEFF generated a platform for artists identifying with the audiovisual and performative investigation of tensions between the environment, body, ancestry, and memory and located in diverse natural and cultural landscapes: from the Amazon rainforest to

Mongolia's steppes and Oceania's deep sea, from Ethiopian deserts to European capitals and North American industrial parks.

While expanding in-person events to Australia, the US, and Europe, the 2024 festival edition received nearly 800 entries from more than 80 countries, highlighting the collaborative spirit among creators from multiple ethnicities united by transcultural problem awareness and elective affinities.

Introduction

Weird's Tale – There Will Come Soft Rains is the title of the live multimedia ecoperformance by Julie (dance), Inga (music) and Rolf (scenography/video-paintings based on community-sourced footage) which will be premiered at Brown University as part of the Rhode Island edition of the International Ecoperformance Film Festival. The performance is part of Julie and Rolf's A(u/r)tistic Ecoperformance on *Film* project, and represents the last installment of a series of works titled the "Weird Works" which began in 2020. Inga joined this project in 2023 as a music composer, bringing a combination of acoustic and live electronic music.

In Norse mythology, *Weird*, also known as Urðr or Wyrd, is one of the three Norns (or fate makers) that sway human destiny. *Weird* is commonly assigned to the past, while her sisters Verdandi and Skuld respectively represent the present and that which yet must become. In the spirit of the ecoperformance art concept, Weird matters insofar as how we engage with the past and act (or do not act), influences the future.

Three of the *Weird Works* were premiered in previous editions of the International Ecoperformance Film Festival. *Weird Drawn At Land*, which premiered in the first edition of the International Ecoperformance Film Festival in 2021, engaged with the landscape and with the ecological issues of Lista, a municipality of Southern Norway. *Weird Works the Bridge*, which premiered in 2022, was partly filmed in New York city, and showed the encounter between Weird and a definitely more urban landscape, depicting all possible/impossible times of the "New World". *Weird From Iceland - quo vadis nomen nescio*, which premiered in 2023, chronicled the encounter between Weird and Northern Iceland's weird and magical landscape. All the commotion of the people and of the land is ready to begin once again in Providence.

For the IVth Edition, Weird returns in *Weird's Tale*, drawing inspiration from Sara Teasdale's war-time poem *There Will Come Soft Rains* (1918) and Ray Bradbury's eponymous short story (1950). The performance also pays tribute to, H.P. Lovecraft, the creator of the Cthulhu Mythos, and it opens with a projection of an excerpt from "The Call of Cthulhu." This fictional horror story, first published in the pulp magazine Weird Tales, is one of Lovecraft's most popular works. It ignited the Cthulhu Mythos, taken up by Donna J. Haraway in her discussion of the Chtulucene, an epoch after the Anthropocene, where the survivors of the human-made environmental catastrophe would join and reunite, human and non-human alike, to create co-existence and harmonic ways of mutual subsistence. The performance might not be able to lead us there yet, but it is an attempt to begin this journey, to open up space for other ways of moving, being and performing.

Welcome to Weird's Tale - There Will Come Soft Rains - it's all yours!

About The Process

Music: Composer Inga Chinilina structures the performance in five tableaus:

- Soft Rains (intro)
- Birds
- Oceans Apart
- Whales
- Soft Rains (coda)

The piece begins with a cello duet, exploring the boundaries of traditional cello performance by using innovative bow techniques and elusive harmonies. This opening, characterized by its instability, invites contemplation on the delicate nature of the present moment.

Transitioning seamlessly, the sound of rain gives way to the joyful melody of bird song, highlighted by a striking blackbird solo piercing through the persistent rain. This connection between nature and movement is exemplified through Julie's use of motion sensors on her wrists and ankle, allowing her every gesture to influence the soundscape. A simple rotation of her hand can either amplify the chorus of birds or silence them altogether, illustrating the intricate relationship between human actions and their impact on the environment.

The performance also explores the indirect effects of human activity on nature. Through a poignant representation of two whales communicating through cello music, the piece brings awareness to the tragic consequences of human interference on marine life. These whale melodies are transcriptions of the actual recordings from the Watkins Sea Mammal Archive. The subsequent inclusion of actual recordings from the archive serves as a reminder of the dependency of these creatures on Julie's movements.

As the piece draws to a close, the gentle patter of rain returns, accompanied by Sarah Teasdale's poignant poem, "There Will Come Soft Rains" (1918). Written during a tumultuous period in history, the poem resonates with the overarching theme of the intertwining of nature and humanity explored throughout the performance, providing a fitting conclusion to this evocative journey.

Visual Environment and Scenography: Rolf Gerstlauer usually performs together with Julie while registering her movements together with the environment on video and photo. From this material he then crafts their a(u/r)tistic ecoperformance on film, but for this performance the process is reversed and Rolf manufactures three multi layered videos for each of the five tableaus. The videos are treated like paintings, both figurative and abstract, and consist of digitally altered photographs and video footage provided by Rhode Islanders interspersed with footage made by his students. The various layers of these video paintings are screened on two transparent screens (scrims), on Julie's dancing body, and at times also onto the audience. The two big scrims are building both the stage and the scenography, or the visual environment Julie interacts with and/or dances within. The experience, although a stage-performance where Julie will appear in-between the two scrims, is expected to create an immersive dreamlike sensation for the audience, showing the alchemy or magic of transmuting matter - and perhaps revealing both the strengths and the weaknesses of our imagination.

Costumes: Wenkai Xu invites cats, foxes, elephants and many other animals to partake in the performance by being part of the costumes. The glass pieces which appear in the films are literally materialized on the costume, through a cyanotype printing process.

Dance: Julie Dind, also known as NN - Nomen Nescio, No Name, or just Not Neurotypical - is Weird. Interacting both with the visual environment created by Rolf and with the soundscape created by Inga and the costumes created by Wenkai, she aims to dance not *in* but *with* the environment. Her dance is rooted in (her) autistic embodiment and ways of perceiving the world. Whereas we tend to regard dance as a human practice and as a practice that centers the human, she is interested in exploring ways of dancing that do not center the human, but open space(s) for the environment to come dancing. She moves at times erratically, sometimes in stillness, but always autistically.

Artist Biographies

Inga Chinilina (composition) is a composer, improviser, and pianist based in Providence, Rhode Island. Inga's music reflects on a range of social topics such as immigration, womanhood, and ecology. Her compositional practice spans acoustic and electroacoustic (fixed and real-time) realms with instrumentation from solo instruments to orchestra. In addition to stand-alone music pieces, Inga also makes installations, music for dance and film. Ensembles that performed Inga's work include Jack Quartet, ICE Ensemble, and Dal Niente. Inga is a PhD candidate in "Music and Multimedia Composition" at Brown University. Her research explores how composers represent sound entities that bare emotional meaning and possess complex timbre through the use of Western-European instruments.

Julie Dind (performer) is a butoh dancer, a multidisciplinary artist, and a PhD candidate in Theatre Arts and Performance Studies at Brown University. Her artistic and scholarly work autistically explores autistic modes of performance. She dedicated over a decade to the study of butoh, both in Japan and abroad. Since 2012, she collaborates with Rolf Gerstlauer on an a(u/r)tistic research-creation project titled "Drawing NN Inside Butoh." As part of this collaboration, she has performed internationally in over 40 site-specific performances. Her work has been presented at various locations, including Sørlandsutsillingen (Norway), The Invisible Dog (New York) and Ós Textile Residency (Iceland). **Rolf Gerstlauer** (scenography) is a Swiss-born architect, filmmaker, multidisciplinary artist, and professor at The Oslo School of Architecture and Design. His teachings and artistic research works investigate Body & Space Morphologies in a more-than-human world. Working with performing arts including dance, choreography, live-installations, land art and earthworks, he uses mainly video and photography as the tools to explore environmental and socio-cultural conditions and phenomena. The collaboration with Julie Dind resulted in their participation in all three previous International Ecoperformance Film-Festivals, several articles and essays as well as a new teaching format on ecoperformance in architecture.

Tyler J. Borden Hailed for his "technically polished playing" (Jan Jezioro, Artvoice) as well as his "astounding performances of superlatively difficult modernist solo works" (Edge of the Center), Tyler J. Borden is a dedicated purveyor of modern and experimental music. His improvisational approach developed over years of sessions and touring, both solo and with iconoclastic musicians such as Jack Wright, Brandon Lopez, and Steve Baczkowski. His language is informed by practical exploration of psychoacoustics, just intonation and his experience as a chamber musician, playing with groups like the [Switch~ Ensemble], Ghost Ensemble, & Mivos Quartet and working with composers like Brian Ferneyhough, Alvin Lucier, Ambrose Akinmusire, & Catherine Lamb. He also regularly organizes concerts - currently, his curatorial efforts are mostly focused on High Desert Soundings, an outdoor festival in Wonder Valley CA, and Uptown Mainstream, the moniker under which he organizes shows in Brooklyn.

John Popham (cello) is a cellist and educator based in New York City. His recent work explores parachronistic musical practices, the multiplicity and instability of performing bodies, and the agency of musical instruments. His playing has been described as "brilliant" and "virtuosic" (Kronen Zeitung), "warm but variegated" and "finely polished" (The New York Times). John is a founding member of Longleash, an "expert young trio" praised for its "subtle and meticulous musicianship" (Strad Magazine). Recent and upcoming appearances include Monday Evening Concerts, TIME: SPANS; Black Mountain College, reMusik (St. Petersburg), Jeunesse (Vienna), and Atlátszó Hang Fesztivál (Budapest). He has recorded for Tzadik, Carrier, New Focus, and Albany records. John co-directs The Loretto Project, a Kentucky-based creative residency and concert series. He holds degrees from the Manhattan School of Music and the CUNY Graduate Center and was a Fulbright Scholar at the Kunstuniversität Graz. John is cello faculty in the Juilliard School's Preparatory Division.

Wenkai Xu (costumes) is an architect and craftswoman working with various materials. She is also teaching in the Body & Space Morphologies Catharsis studio as assistant professor at the Oslo School of Architecture and Design. Lately she's experimenting with casting glass and making ceramics in the studio course with students. She likes cats and making things.

Artist Biographies

Maura Baiocchi (Curator) is a Brazilian choreographer, director and founder of the São Paulo-based dance-theater-group Taanteatro Companhia (1991) and the International Ecoperformance Film-Festival (2021). "Ecoperformance," a term coined by Baiocchi in 2009, pertains to the conceptual framework of her performing arts approach called "taanteatro" or "choreographic theater of tensions". After studying classical and modern dance in the 1970s, she became a Brazilian Butoh pioneer, studying with Kazuo Ohno and Min Tanaka in Japan in the 1980s. Baiocchi created around 60 stage works performed in Brazil and abroad, taught at the National University of Brasilia, and published eight books about her research.

Wolfgang Pannek (Curator) is a German-born director and producer. He is co-director of Taanteatro Companhia and coordinator of the International Ecoperformance Film Festival. Pannek organized and edited the book *Ecoperformance* (2022) and curated the dossier on Ecoperformance in the Brazilian journal *Art of Stage*. With a Master of Arts from FernUniversität Hagen, his career spans over 30 years comprising projects in Germany, Brazil, Argentina, Japan, and Mozambik. His recent stage works include *cARTAUDgraphy* (2015), *1001 Plateaux* (2017), *Messages from Mozambique* (2018), and *Chissano - Rite for Mabungulane* (2020). Pannek has co-authored several books with Maura Baiocchi, including *Choreographic Theater of Tensions: Forces & Forms* (2020). Macarena Gómez-Barris (Juror) is a writer and scholar with a focus on the decolonial environmental humanities, authoritarianism and extractivism, queer Latinx epistemes, media environments, racial ecologies, cultural theory and artistic practice. She is currently the Timothy C. Forbes and Anne S. Harrison University Professor of Modern Culture and Media, and the Chair of the Modern Culture and Media Department at Brown University. She is author of four books, including The Extractive Zone: Social Ecologies and Decolonial Perspectives (Duke University Press, 2017) that examines five scenes of ruinous extractive capitalism, and Beyond the Pink Tide: Art and Political Undercurrents in the Américas (UC Press 2018), a text of critical hope about the role of submerged art and solidarities in troubled times. Her forthcoming book, At the Sea's Edge (Duke University Press), considers colonial oceanic transits and the generative space between land and sea. She is on the Social Text Collective, co-Director of the Queer Aqui Project at Columbia University, and on the Executive Editor Board of GLQ. She received the Pratt Institute Research Recognition Award (2021-2022) and the University of California, Santa Cruz Distinguished Alumni Award (2021-2022). She was founder and director of Global South Center, NYC and organizes a new series called Writing Media Now hosted by the Department of Modern Culture and Media at Brown.

Nattie Trogdon and Hollis Bartlett are partners in both life and creative endeavors. They construct dance works, films and research based practices aimed to disrupt assumptions of performance and personhood. Their live performance collaborations have been presented at venues throughout NYC and New England and their site-specific work and films have been commissioned by festivals throughout the US. They've received residency support through LMCC, Marble House, The Atlantic Center for the Arts, Mana Contemporary and the New Directions Choreography Lab at The Ailey School. @nattietroggie @holbart

Salt Salome creates another dimension (mimodrame) where past, present and future, real and imaginary, hallucinatory and dreamlike merge into a single dimension. She experiments with different aspects of time: its non-linearity, its cyclicality, its multi-dimensionality.

Chloe Zimmerman is a filmmaker, artist, writer and educator working across analogue film, video, installation, drawing, language art and pedagogical experiments. Her films have screened via the Criterion Channel, UnionDocs, Anthology Film Archives, the Poetry Project and MoMA PS1, among other venues. She holds an MFA from Brown University.
